By centering the individual needs of our students, I am confident that CEP will continue to grow and bring transformative educational support to Bay Area children experiencing homelessness and housing insecurity.

I would like to take this opportunity to express my gratitude to everyone who supported CEP in 2022, especially during our period of transition as I began my new role as Executive Director. # DID YOU KNOW? 250,000 + 10,000 +

At any given point, 250,000 children and youth are experiencing homelessness or housing insecurity in California (California Research Bureau, 2022) An estimated 10,000 unstably housed children and youth are enrolled in Bay Area schools. (California Research Bureau, 2022).



Youth who do not have a high school diploma or equivalent have a 346% higher risk of experiencing young adult homelessness (Morton et al., 2017).

## MISSION

Our mission is to increase the learning opportunities and enhance the academic achievement of students experiencing homelessness and housing insecurity.

### VALUES

CEP is a response to the inequitable, but predictable, distribution of housing and educational opportunities. Without large-scale structural and economic reparations and the redistribution of resources from the few to the many, far too many families and children will continue to struggle to secure safe and suitable housing and access high-quality educational opportunities.

As we approach our work, we acknowledge that:

- Access to safe and appropriate housing and high-quality educational opportunities are fundamental rights that are denied to too many.
- Homelessness and housing instability need not, but too often do, create obstacles to learning and educational access.
- Education is empowering.
- So-called "achievement gaps" are better understood as "opportunity gaps."
- There is intrinsic value in learning, even if not aimed at academic achievement.
- Everyone can learn if given the opportunity, tools, time, and support to do so.
- All students deserve to be held to high expectations and set up for academic success.

Our philosophy of service is based on:

- Respect, humility, and non-judgment.
- The recognition that with our privilege comes the opportunity and responsibility to show up and use our advantages and resources to help our neighbors.
- The belief that all children have a right to be seen, heard, and valued and that showing up for children now can have a life-long impact.
- An acknowledgment that the communities we serve are best able to identify their needs and priorities and that their voices and guidance should direct our planning and decision making.
- The recognition that, through service, we can build meaningful connections between individuals and groups who are often segregated from each other.

Academic skills are key to students' success and to them reaching their full potential. CEP provides high-quality, individualized one-onone academic tutoring and mentoring for our students, as well as enrichment and group programming.

CEP works to ensure that all students perform at or above grade level.

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
CEP works to ensure that all of our students are on track to graduate high school or receive an equivalent certificate.

CEP works to ensure that all of our students find the joy and purpose of education.

To provide high-quality, individualized tutoring and mentoring, CEP volunteers meet their students for a minimum of one hour per week for six months. Volunteer tutors focus on literacy, math, and other academic subjects based on students' grade levels, interests, and areas needing support. In addition, CEP staff conduct Education Wellness Checks and Education Coordination Services for our students to further enhance and individualize our services and connect students to other needed supports and resources.



### MIT BOUND: SPOTLIGHT ON CEP STUDENT ACHIEVEMENT

College applications, calculus, and cloud chambers – a tutoring session between Patrick (CEP volunteer) and Aiden (High School Senior) is never dull! The two have used their weekly tutoring meetings to go above and beyond Aiden's high school curriculum, finding new challenges and interests to explore together.

Patrick and Aiden started working together in the summer of 2019, just before Aiden started Berkeley High School. Once the initial freshman jitters dissipated, it became clear that Aiden was a motivated student with a strong affinity for all things STEM (science, technology, engineering, math). Each week, Patrick drew from his education and experiences at UC Berkeley to show how math and physics are used to solve real world engineering problems.

When Aiden mentioned their interests in 3D printing and math modeling, the lesson plans quickly transitioned into joint research projects. As Patrick says: "Our relationship is a two-way street; my main goal is to listen and pose questions that encourage critical thinking. We combine our curiosity and work together to uncover new ways of viewing the world around us." In the last year, college applications became a main focus of their weekly meetings, and the pair spent many hours researching schools and editing personal statements. Ultimately, Aiden's effort paid off with a full-ride scholarship to MIT!

Patrick first started tutoring in 2018 and, after mentoring two students, he expressed an interest in working with high schoolers who are interested in math. Aiden's mother was referred to CEP during a period of housing insecurity when consistent academic support was critical in Aiden's transition out of middle school. Thankfully, the timing was perfect, and a CEP staff member facilitated the pairing that led to a long-term match. Aiden says, "I view Patrick as a friend and look forward to keeping in touch once I'm in college. We enjoy working on difficult questions tagether, and I've grown as a result of our relationship." The CEP team and the community are very proud of Aiden and grateful for Patrick's dedication.



In 2022, CEP team members worked tirelessly to connect volunteers to children who need additional academic support and encouragement. Our programs nurtured the individual needs of our students and helped families navigate through challenging systems. CEP is proud to continue meeting students where they are, no matter where they may be (in an encampment, a shelter, a public library, etc.), to support their academic aspirations and performance.




### EARLY LITERACY PROGRAM

CEP's Early Literacy Program is designed to provide targeted literacy support for pre-K – 5th-grade students experiencing homelessness and housing instability. The program's specific goals align with those of the National Campaign for Grade-Level Reading.

#### LEARNING AND FUN AT THE CLC

The Children's Learning Center (CLC) is open five days per week and serves more than 50+ students each year. In 2022, students at the CLC received hundreds of hours of literacy instruction and support, participated in dozens of STEAM (science, technology, Engineering, Art, and Math) lessons, received homework support, took piano lessons, played and socialized with their siblings and other residents, took numerous field trips, played educational games, sang songs, did cooking lessons, and so much more!





The Children's Learning Center is a welcoming, supportive, educational, and fun place where children can learn, play, and thrive right where they reside, in the Family Matters shelter in Oakland. It is a place of deep learning, exploration, and fun, all of which support our students' academic, social, and emotional growth.
